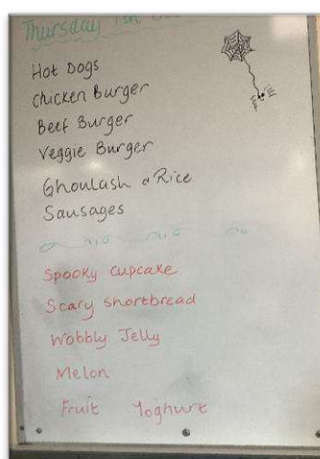
AT Durham Lane we like to keep things interesting, and that includes in the dinner hall.

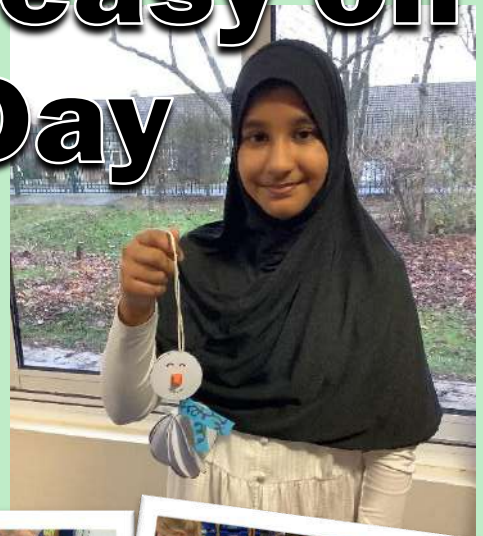
Looking after pupils' wellbeing is extremely important at Durham Lane Primary School.

NOT many schools can say that they have two different uniforms, but at Durham Lane we do!

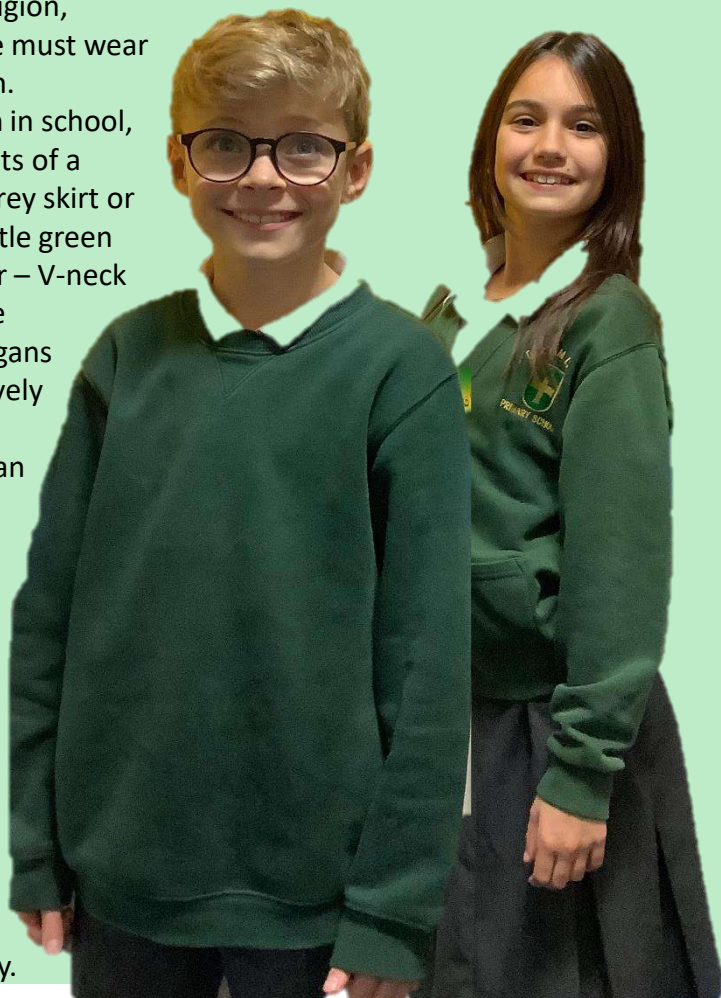
So, what uniforms *does* Durham Lane have, and why is there more than one?
